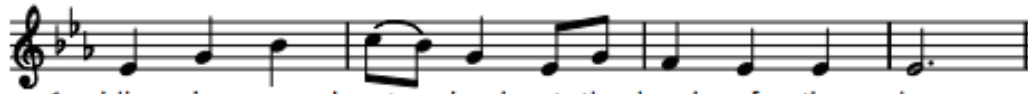

But the tax collector stood off at a distance and would not even raise his eyes to heaven but beat his breast and prayed, 'O God, be merciful to me a sinner.'

I believe in one holy, catholic and apostolic Church.


I confess one baptism for the forgiveness of sins and
